


ANNUAL REPORT 2018-2019



Jeevajyothi's Octave Wheel





An amputated ex government employee regained his hope

Venkatesan aged 53 is an orthopaedic disabled living in Thirunilai village of Sholavaram block with his wife and two daughters. He was working in Metro Transport as cleaner. On that sad day he was on his duty unluckily the Pallavan bus which was coming against him dashed his left hand and his hand got amputated. Life was really going on well before that accident but that pathetic incident turned his life worse.

Before the intervention

When our CBR worker conducted a survey we found that he was struggling to manage his daily routines and he was not given job because of his condition when he went in search of job. He expressed to her it is now very difficult to run my family without any work. I feel depressed and lost and I really do not know how I am going to support my children's education and my family, expressed venkatesn in grief. He was not having a disability ID card and did not avail any sort support from government.


After the intervention

At first we referred him to Tiruvallur GH and helped him avail disability ID card and then registered him with DDAWO for his pension. In the course of time he received PHP every month and we also enrolled him in VDPO and he started his savings and got some financial support from VDPO. Almost a year he was running his life on this pattern and he was regular to the meetings and trainings related to CBR

project. When fellowship project through APPI was implemented in the month of May 2018, we appointed him as our fellow and now he is earning Rs. 5000/- per month and at present he is working for 100 PWDs and supporting for their entitlements and services with greater zeal. Recently he managed to start 4 VDPOs and guiding them well as he was guided by his leaders earlier. He also availed Rs.75000/- subsidized loan through our support and he is planning to put up a shop with that money. At present he feels a sort of relief from his bad pathetic condition which was toiling him and now he feels happy to run his family...

On the whole, an overall number of **19** Children were provided with Shelter care, Nutritious food, Health Care, Educational materials and extra coaching on academics in the Shelter Home during the reporting period. Through MM's support, nutritious food was provided to the children of 2 DCCs (Attapalayam and Kalanjiyam) from Jan-Dec'18 and 2 DCCs (Athivakkam and KN Nagar) from Jul-Dec'18. It also supported the salaries of these 2 DCCs for Jul-Dec'18. The number of children in these DCC's during the reporting period was floating due to the admissions of new children in between and the drop out of few children due to migration. However, on the whole 106 children benefitted from all these DCC's during the reporting period.

Main Achievements:

Education

- 19 children were provided with supplementary education care in the Shelter
- 19 children from Shelter Home have accessed the books from the Library
- Admission of 7 children in the year happened in the Shelter home
- 1 DCC Child from Athivakkam was enrolled in formal school in Grade 1 in the month of Jun'18
- 10 Children's Committee meetings were organized in the shelter home for the children on 05/02/2018, 03/03/2018, 07/04/2018, 09/06/2018, 07/07/2018, 11/08/2018, 08/09/2018, 07/10/2018, 17/11/2018 and 09/12/2018
- 2 Parents Teachers meeting were attended by the Project Coordinator on 05/02/2018 and 30/11/2018
- 4 Parents meetings were held in the shelter Home on 19/04/2018,02/06/2018,14/10/2018 and 23/12/2018 which was attended by parents of 6 children on an average.

Health

- 19 children benefited from medical camps organized at the shelter home on 23/03/2018, 23/06/2018, 24/08/2018 and 24/11/2018. They were treated for minor ailments, provided medicines and health tonics.
- The village Health Nurse visited the DCCs every month to check the general check condition of the children and provided necessary medicines for the needed children.

Community

- National Anti-Child Labour program was conducted by JJ's staff at Athivakkam Rice Mills on 30.04.2018, with the participation of Rice Mill and Brick-kiln workers.
- Labours Day program was conducted by JJ's Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) project staff at Athivakkam Rice Mill on 01.05.2018, with the participation of Rice mill workers.
- 18 children from shelter home participated in the World Environment Day and Earth day Program conducted at the shelter home by a Professor from Loyola College on 09/06/2018.
- The school of Shelter home boys were visited by the Project Coordinator who also participated in the Parents Teachers Association Meeting on 23/10/2018 and 30/11/2018
- 18 children from shelter home participated in the World Environment Day and Earth day Program conducted at the shelter home by a Professor from Loyola College on 09/06/2018.
- Cesvi India staff visited the project area on 07/08/2018, interacted with the children and staff, checked the records and gave inputs to the project staff regarding the activities. The staff also participated in the Christmas programme with the children in the Shelter home on 22/12/2018.
- 14 children from Athivakkam DCC and 25 children from KN Nagar DCC observed silence for few minutes on 16/07/2018 in remembrance of the children who lost their lives in Kumbakonam Fire accident on 16/07/2014
- 20 children from both the DCC's were taken to Athivakkam area for the 72nd Independence Day celebration on 15/08/2018

External Activities

- Social Defence team made a visit to the Shelter home on 27/02/2018

- Project Coordinator participated in a meeting organized for NGOs by District Child Protection Office (DCPO) for Homes on 03/01/2018 in DCPO, Thiruvallur.
- From shelter home, 1 child completed UNNATI Training (for 50 days) on Computer, English and Life coping Skills for 40 days during the summer holidays and 2 children went for the Vocational Bible Study (VBS) training program which covered topics on environment for 10 days.
- Botany Department students from Stella Maris College created an awareness to 19 children at the shelter home through skits and talk on the ill effects of plastics on 28/07/2018 as part of their outreach program. They also taught the children to make paper bags.
- Project Coordinator and Warden attended the Disaster Management training on North East Monsoon on 11/09/2018 at Thiruvallur District Collector Office.
- An awareness programme on Addiction was given for Shelter home boys by Internship students from Loyola College, DG.Vaishnava and Presidency college
- The Project Coordinator and Warden attended the Disaster Management training on North East Monsoon on 11/09/2018 at Thiruvallur District Collector Office.
- Project Coordinator also participated in a Workshop on Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction-Paris Agreement on Climate Change and Assessment and Response Management Systems on 18 & 19/12/2018.

1. Residential Shelter Care

The project year started from January'18 with 15 children who continued from 2017. The children started their regular activities in the month of January after they came back to the shelter home from Christmas Holidays. Since the month of March had Board exams and Annual exams, the shelter boys were oriented and instructed to give importance to their education than any other activities. Most of their regular activities were rescheduled and altered to enable them to concentrate more on studies. 15 shelter home boys prepared to attend their annual exams. All of them had passed their examination. 1 boy who passed in class 12 was admitted in a college in Madurai in B.Com. All the other children were promoted to the next classes and continued. Children went home for summer holidays in May and returned in the first week of June'18.

The academic year in schools for 2018-19 started in the month of June'18. 6 new children were admitted in June (1 was referred by an NGO, 2 were identified by staff and 4 referred by other known individuals to JJ shelter home) while 2 children left the shelter home since their mothers wanted to take them back. Beds were provided to all the children to give them a comfortable sleep. Instructions were given by the warden to all the children especially the new inmates to follow the regular norms of the school and shelter home. At the beginning of the academic year, children had time to focus on some extra-curricular activities like leadership training program, herbal gardening and reducing plastic waste. 1 new boy was admitted bringing the strength to 19 children as of Sep'18 end. All children went home for Quarterly holidays in Sep'18 and returned in the first week of October'18. On the whole, during the reporting period, the shelter home provided its care and services to 19 Children who are from different background.

2. Distribution of Educational materials to the children in the home

The objective of supporting for education is to provide an opportunity to each child to enjoy the Right to Education and continue to pursue their interest in academics and overall development. Basic educational materials like school uniform, belt, school bag, pens, pencils, erasers, book note book and shoe etc. were given in June'18 to 19 children in the shelter home. Few materials like pens, pencils, erasers etc. relevant for exams were given to them again in the month of Sep'18.

3. Exposure tours for children

Exposure visits are generally planned for the shelter home children every year so that they get an opportunity to explore different places and know their history. They are free from studies and other responsibilities during such trips. It is mostly fun filled and useful. Children were taken for an exposure visit on 25/08/2018 to Madhavaram Botanical Garden in Chennai which was set up by the Horticulture department of the Government of Tamil Nadu. The garden located at the State horticulture farm in Madhavaram Milk Colony encompasses an area of 28 acres. A small bridge has been built to attract birds from where visitors will get a view of the lake. The garden has nearly 400 species of plants. The garden has different types of herbal plants, flowers, bonsai and trellis gardens, in addition to mazes, a play area for children, cascades and many fountains. The garden also has an open-air theatre with a capacity to seat nearly 150 people. Children enjoyed the tour in the garden.

4. Medical Check-up for the children in the Shelter home

The medical check-up generally ensures that each child in the Shelter Home can have access to health facilities. These screenings will ensure treatment of simple and viral diseases and also referral service for chronic or specific complaints. Medical camps were organized by JJ on 23/03/2018, 23/06/2018 and 24/11/2018 for the Shelter home children. They were screened, treated for minor ailments, provided medicines and health tonics.

5. Supplementary Educational Care

The shelter home children were given special coaching on their academic lessons by the Warden cum Tutor on a daily basis. When the school reopened in the month of June'18, instructions were given by the Tutor to all the children especially the new inmates to maintain their books properly without damaging them, to attend school regularly, to give attention to the lessons taught in the classes, to complete the homework when they come back from school, to clarify the doubts with the Tutor on a daily basis, to take extra support from him for weaker subjects etc. Children were also motivated to participate in the extra-curricular activities. The warden also guided the new children to follow the norms pertaining to the study hours and more time was spent with them to identify their weak subjects in order to provide the needed support. The children received the help of the tutor in doing their homework and clarified all doubts pertaining to the subjects.

6. Parents and Teachers meeting

The Project Coordinator participated in 2 Parents teachers meeting on 05/02/2018 and 30/11/2018 at Budur Government Higher Secondary School where the Shelter home children were studying. He discussed with the School Head Master and teachers about the children's performance in general.

7. Leadership Training for adolescent children

Young people have the capacity to become leaders in their chosen field of endeavour if given the exposure to concepts of leadership and the opportunity to demonstrate their skills through positive social action. Hence a leadership training program was organised for shelter home children by JJ on 07/07/2018 which was participated by 19 children from the shelter home. The resource person was Mr.Srinivasan, from Nirchand Nutrition and Wellness Centre who is an expert in Camp Base activity. Training included sessions on Leadership skills, Self-esteem, Self-awareness, Decision making, Problem Solving, Time Management, Value Education, Good touch/bad touch, Discipline, Disaster Management, Communication, Healthy Food and practical demonstrations on Self-defence, Herbal gardening, organic farming, etc. The camp concluded with the fire camp.

Supportive Activities:

a. Counselling: Counselling support is an on-going activity where the service is offered to the shelter home children and their parents. Children who faced the Board exams were provided weekly counselling to motivate and encourage them to build confidence in facing the exams and also

created an interest about pursuing their college studies after school. 7 New children admitted in the Shelter home were counselled to make them comfortable in the new place.

b. Children's Committee: Children's committee activities generally facilitate them to lay a path for their self-development and to deal effectively with the issues that they meet in day-to-day life. 10 Meetings were held during the year on 05/02/2018, 03/03/2018, 07/04/2018, 09/06/2018, 07/07/2018, 11/08/2018, 08/09/2018, 07/10/2018, 17/11/2018 and 09/12/2018. Discussions in most of the meetings were about the preparation for exams without fear, showing interest in gardening, taking turns to water the plants, not wasting food, keeping oneself fit, following the regulations of the shelter home and maintain discipline.

c. Children's Library: The shelter home has a library with a special collection of books on Human Rights, Child Rights, Women rights, Tamil literature and stories intended for the children to acquaint them with the world's literature and to cultivate a love for reading. As exams were nearing, more focus was given to the academics than stories. Hence children referred mostly academic related books during the month. In Q3 after the children settled down with their new academic year's syllabus they also started focussing on the extra-curricular activities. The warden observed that the new children were curious to explore the books in the library. The children accessed the books whenever they had free time.

d. Parents Meeting: 4 Parents meetings were organized by the Coordinator and warden for the parents of the shelter home children on 19/04/2018,02/06/2018,14/10/2018 and 23/12/2018. The Tutor explained about the children's activities and their education status. Some video clips were shown to the participants about the participation of the children in cultural and sports activities. The Project Coordinator also interacted with the children and their parents. Later the Tutor spoke about educational status and the future of the children who were in classes 10 and 12. Precautions to be taken to handle the hot summer was also stressed.

Prime strategy of CBR approach is that which involves participatory mechanism and participatory approach of PWDs, Family and stake holders of the area for the smooth functioning of the project. Thus, CBR approach or model implemented following services/activities

- ✓ Identifying PWDs through Base Line survey
- ✓ Identifying and collating information through need assessment
- ✓ Disseminating awareness on Preventive methods of disability
- ✓ Promoting awareness on rehabilitation through 2E method(Early identification and early Intervention)
- ✓ Facilitating PWDs to avail entitlements, aids and appliances

- ✓ Facilitating the access to therapy, ADLS and Home Based Interventions
- ✓ Enabling PWMI access assessment, medication and Rehabilitation
- ✓ Organizing Health & Hygiene programs for Adolescents and WWDs
- ✓ Motivating Parents to enroll CWDs in schools
- ✓ Forming and strengthening integrated Children Clubs in school
- ✓ Providing an access to youth, adult with disabilities career guidance, job referrals, skill training for their livelihood promotion
- ✓ Facilitating the access to Schemes, benefits
- ✓ Encouraging PWDs to participate in Gram Saba
- ✓ Motivating PWDs to partake in Marriage Mela and Family life
- ✓ Enabling PWDs gain knowledge on Laws, Acts and Schemes
- ✓ Observing National, International days with a special focus on 'International Day of People with Disabilities' by organizing disabled friendly events for increasing their participation
- ✓ Organizing Block/District level interface with Government Officials

Our continuous service to these most deserving PWDs has yielded many good results and we were able to see and witness concrete changes in the lives of our target beneficiaries. We would like to put forth some of our major achievements in the field of health, education, livelihood, social and Empowerment.

Highlighting some of our matrix wise results

Health

- 75 %(3/4) of Children with disability in the project area have an adequate level of health (0- 5 Years)
- 75 %(40/53)of children with disability needed self-care development, in the project area have improved level of self-care
- 88 %(35/40)of children with disability, needed self-care development, in the project area have improved level of Communication
- 82 %(364/443)of adults with disability had restricted access / extent of mobility, in the Project areas have improved mobility those who access more places and persons
- 84% (91/108) of adults with disability needed behavioural development in the project area have improved behaviour.
- 88 %(65/74) of villages where villagers take an interest in those with MI/SD
- 88 %(65/74)ensure that resources for medication are available (ex. medicines supplied through Govt. health services, or through project

Education

- 92% (68/74) of villages having Anganwadi/ School going CWDs, where 80% of eligible CwDs go to Anganwadi / school regularly
- 94% (67/71) of children with disability achieved the intended academic competencies
- 87% (62/71) of children with disability achieved desired non-academic competencies (This includes socially acceptable behaviour, self-confidence, initiative and creativity, working in a group))

Livelihood

- 89% (512/573) of adults with disability are engaged in productive activities# that contribute to their family income or wellbeing(# Activities which create goods and services objectively valuable to self/family whether or not it is economically profitable, ex- cooking, care of child etc.)
- 37% (211/573) of adults with disability have increased income to meet their own needs.
- 89%(584/658)of persons with disability have accessed social security benefits and skill development/ livelihood opportunities through support from the local community

Social

- 89%(585/658) of children and adults who participate in all family events/ activities
- 89 %(585/658) of children and adults who participate in the socio-cultural activities of their community.
- 70%(412/592) of adolescents/ adults participate in family decision making
- 50% (296/592)of adolescents / adults with disability are members of decision making bodies (religious, cultural, social, administrative bodies)

Empowerment

- 96% (43/45) of VDPOs have been formed and functioning effectively with 487 memberships
- 77%(33/43)of DPOs have ensured access to services and entitlements for PwDs and other needy members of the community
- 62 %(46/74) of villages in which there is active intervention for inclusion and development of PwDs through the involvement of DPO members.
- 51 %(204/402) of PwDs through participation in the DPOs have become capable of making choices for their life and work to achieve them.
- 13%(3/24)of PwDs are members of District level forums such as VASANTHAM FEDERATION
